I would like to say thank you, but not goodbye to the IMAC Organization (family) for these last 15 years. (Almost 10 with the BOD)



Learning About Aresti!

Introduction

We are going to dig into Aresti a little deeper with each upcoming newsletter, but to start with here is a little background on how it all started. **Aresti is globally universal, just like reading sheet music!**

When full scale aerobatics first came into being in the 1920s, there was no good method for pilots to explain to others what they were going to fly. Some used their own method of shorthand notations, others would describe the maneuver with various words and phrases. But as the sport of aerobatics began to mature and spread into international competition, the need for a standardized method to describe aerobatic flight maneuvers grew due to language differences.

In 1961, the Spanish pilot **José Luis de Aresti** published an aerocryptographic system to describe aerobatic maneuvers that broke down individual pieces into lines, curves and rotational elements. This **Sistema Aresti**, or **Aresti System**, was adopted by the Fédération Aéronautique Internationale (World Air Sports Federation or FAI) as the official method of aerobatic sequence description at the World Aerobatic Championships in Bilboa, Spain in 1964. Today, the Aresti System – called Aresti for short – is in use worldwide. It allows a Russian pilot to fly a U.S. sequence in front of an Italian judge and no one needs to speak a foreign language to make it happen!

The International Sequence Committee,

A Peek Behind the Veil!

Every IMAC pilot knows the thrill (or dread?) of receiving the unknown sequences at the end of the day on Saturday. The angst of visualizing and memorizing the sequence without actually putting a plane in the air, and then the anticipation of getting one chance to get it right and outscore your competitors. Nothing levels the playing field for pilots like a challenging unknown sequence. But where do these sequences come from?

On nearly every weekend of the year, somewhere in the world, there is an IMAC contest looking for unknowns. That's four original sequences roughly 50 weekends a year, or 200 original sequences every year. These sequences are all constructed by the hardest working committee in IMAC – The International Sequence Committee (ISC). As of this writing, there are 9 people currently working on the committee, and we're seeking additional help, but more on that later.


So how are these sequences developed? For many years, the ISC has used Microsoft Visio and a free add-on for Aresti. Although a very powerful program, Microsoft Visio required a lot of work to draw and place figures in a clear format, and properly placing and showing roll elements took even more work. Sequence authors would spend a couple of hours or more creating sequences. But that is just the tool for drawing the sequences. How do the authors know what figures and rolls they can use?

IMAC uses the Radio Control Catalogs from Aresti Systems, currently the 2018 versions. Those catalogs were developed in cooperation with CIVA, IAC, and IMAC to identify the legal figures for each competition class. Those catalogs contain the rules for sequence construction, and each sequence author must know those rules as they construct a sequence. For example, did you know that Sportsman unknowns cannot exceed 360 degrees of roll on any line and that there cannot

be any unlinked roll elements? There are also restrictions on where quarter or three-quarter rolls can be used. There are similar restrictions for Intermediate, Advanced, and Unlimited. Yes, there are limits on Unlimited.

So the sequence designer has at hand the software and the catalog of figures. But just like having a dictionary and a pen is not sufficient to write a story, the sequence writer must bring the elements together. Like an artist painting a canvas, the sequence writer begins with a rough vision of what they want to create. Some work one figure at a time, adding roll elements to base figures one figure at a time. Others create the sequence of base figures, then go back and add roll elements, like an artist adds color details to a painting.

But just putting the figures on paper still doesn't get the job done. The author must be continuously thinking as the sequence builds. Where is the pilot going to fly this figure? Is it going to make a tight footprint where it's easier to see the plane, or is it likely to send the pilot way out to the ends of the flight area? Is it going to send the pilot further from the flight line? Will the judges be able to see the elements? The sequence committee has several guidelines, in addition to the construction rules, that we use. For example, we try to minimize the use of a 45-degree line away from a center box figure. Those elements are best performed across the center. So the author may skip a center box figure and use two turnaround maneuvers to include those 45-degree lines. Similarly, the number of roll stops on uplines and downlines may be limited to avoid forcing the pilot to extreme altitudes. The sequence author is looking at the box as 9 zones (left, center, right; low, medium, and high), and trying to use each zone for a balanced sequence. The use of x8-point rolls is typically limited on the high zones because it's too hard for the judges to see those elements.



Finally, the sequence author must be careful about the final K factor of the sequence. Unknowns generally target 80-90 percent of the K-factor for that year's Known sequences, but it may be possible to see unknowns over that value.

Once the author has written a sequence that he or she believes meets the standards for a good sequence, he or she submits it to the committee for review. Two additional committee members review it before it is released for competition. Once it passes the committee checks, the Librarian adds it to the available sequences for issue. Only the Librarian knows which sequences are used on a given weekend, and every IMAC competition on a given weekend uses the same sequences.

Now for some good news!

Over the past several years, a new software product has come on the scene. OpenAero is an opensource web-based sequence drawing program that has taken much of the hard work out of sequence writing. CIVA, IAC, radio control pattern and many other organizations around the world have already adopted OpenAero as their choice for sequence writing, and as of this year, IMAC is joining their ranks. OpenAero has the benefit of having catalogs of allowable figures built into the software. The rules for sequence construction are built-in and automatically checked, creating alerts to the author when something isn't correct. It still requires the author to consider the sequence footprint and is by no means automatic, but it is a huge improvement in our process. And because it's free, anyone can try to write sequences.

But why would anyone want to write sequences? In my years of IMAC competition, I've met several pilots that wanted to be members of the ISC, but the barriers of access to Visio and the catalogs made it too difficult. The ISC was almost a secret society that was very difficult to break into. We are trying to change that, and beginning this year, we are going to allow ANY IMAC Member to submit unknown sequence proposals to the committee. Using OpenAero, the author can write a sequence, include their IMAC Number and email address in the comments for the sequence, and send that sequence to the ISC Chair (me). I will put that sequence into the checking process. Any committee member may review the sequence, and provide comments/recommendations to the author for resolution. Once two independent committee members check the sequence, the original author will get credit for the submission.

And the first 10 IMAC members completing five full sets of unknowns (5 Sportsman, 5 Intermediate, 5 Advanced, and 5 Unlimited) will get a free 1-year IMAC membership.

And before you ask, you don't have to submit all 20 sequences at once. If you're just starting, start with Sportsman, write one sequence, get feedback, and then work your way up. Yes, you can submit unknowns for your class. We'll try to make sure an individual doesn't try to fly a sequence they've written, but over the years I've found I wouldn't recognize a sequence I wrote a few weeks after I wrote it anyway.

There are two 90-minute recordings of training that we did for the sequence committee regarding sequence construction, there is a sequence writing do's and don'ts document, and a couple of images with tips for writing good sequences.

OpenAero is very easy to access. Simply open your browser of choice, although Chrome is recommended, and go to

https://Openaero.net

The application will run in your browser. On the left side of the window, you'll see sequence info. Don't worry about the Pilot, Team, Aircraft Type, or Registration. Below that information you'll see selections for Power, then Rules, Category, and Program. Under Rules, select IMAC, then choose the class and program from the available dropdown selections. Now you're off to the races selecting figures and roll elements.

I also recommend using the IMAC Forums (Hanger) to discuss sequence construction. It's a great place to ask questions, and I'll keep an eye on the discussions to ensure things don't go too far afield. And if you turn out to be a prolific sequence writer, don't be surprised to get an invitation to join the committee.

Our New Website Design

Hello, my name is Dan Carroll and I've been involved in IMAC Australia for about 8 years. In that time I've had a few roles, mainly being CD for competitions and the "State Rep" which is kind of like the ARD role in the US, and then later I served on the committee for a few years as the National Contest Director. But by far the most work I've done is to maintain and develop the IT integration surrounding our scoring software. I'm the main developer of Score! as well as the well used ScorePad iPad software that's very popular here in Australia.

For a little while now, I've been involved in the update of the main IMAC site and as you can see, the old website has now been migrated to a new platform. The old site was using a long ago unsupported piece of content management software which could not be upgraded and it was becoming more difficult to even update content. It was also a major source of security problems and so we really needed to move on.

The new site is running on one Joomla, a popular CMS tool that has a good track record of support and offers plenty of features. Right now, we have the basics up and running but it's a work in progress and we will improve on it over time.

Currently, regional directors can write articles that are posted to each of the region pages and we hope that the RDs will take the opportunity to keep everyone informed here. The points section is a copy of the data from the old site while I finish off the code to import the data from uploaded results. The results pages are also turned off currently as they do still need to be migrated. This will be done when I can get to it as there are a few things I need to arrange first.

What's coming up?

Shortly, I'll have the basic event registration system in place. This will enable CDs to create events and for pilots to register for them after they have been opened for entries.

I hope to build on this base in the future and build a website that will serve the IMAC community well...



Promoting IMAC to new club locations

At the almost rained out 2021 S.E. Regional finals, just over a year ago, an idea was formed to find ways to promote IMAC at clubs and in geographic areas where we didn't have much, if any membership or participation.

That idea finally became a reality with an "In the Box" event package.

For someone with no prior experience in IMAC, and especially for a club that has not previously held an IMAC event, the thought of starting out can be quite intimidating. We didn't want that to be a roadblock.

As ambassadors we cannot let this hinder the growth of our club. Promoting IMAC and increasing the membership is essential. Without it we wouldn't have new pilots to fly in contests and worse yet could end up having just a few limited places to fly.

So, we set out to find a new club that had interest but didn't know where to start. The concept is simple, once we found a new host site, we would bring ALL the resources to the club to run and manage the event - All they need to do is provide the field and a pilot's lunch or meal. Everything else would be run by a group of experienced event volunteers.

Let US bring the IMAC event to the new club instead of overloading them with details

Aka an event "In the Box". A fully packaged, prepared, and delivered event so that the new club's membership has an excellent experience at their home field. Properly executed, their membership will want more, and the club can learn from it to host future events.

As a now experienced event CD and scorekeeper, as many of you are, I have everything needed to run a contest at my disposal. It's often packed into my trailer when going to events anyway just in case any of it is needed... So why not take it on the road to a new field?

The offer to do this was circulated within several new clubs and two are now going to host events. The first one is going to be the "Tarheel Summer IMAC contest" in Elm City North Carolina on July 15th and 16th. Hopefully many of the readers can make a special trip to help show this club what a great organization they are going to get involved with.

On the next page youll see a similar idea that was happening half the world away. Is anyone else doing something like this? Would you like to? and do you have any suggestions on how to make this even more beneficial?

I'd love to get some feedback and discussion going to see how else we can develop ideas.

IMAC Starters Boot League

Introducing IMAC to new pilots

ABOUT THE IMAC STARTERS BOOT LEAGUE:

The challenges that came with the beginning of 2022 required us to figure out ways to overcome overly high expenses and travel issues. This became the next challenge to overcome itself. Thus, the IMAC Starters league was born.

It is a sister league of the regular IMAC league, giving the newcomers the chance to learn directly from some of the best pilots and judges from the regular league.

Its goals are:

- a) Discover new talents disregarding the age or renown of the pilot (we have had some great surprises from pilots over 60 years old)
- b) Create a line of new coming non flying judges.
- c) Promote aerobatics for pilots that want to join the regular league soon in the future or just want to have a great day
- d) Host contests that are extremely affordable, easy to host and quick paced.

Our results in the tests conducted in January and March in México and October and November in Colombia are very flattering. The same is starting to show as 2023 is going by.

In our worst-case scenario one of the invitations was released just 36 hours prior to the scheduled date. Even though 7 new to the sport pilots and 2 new coming judges showed up traveling from 3 different states and bringing planes ranging from small electric/glow sport planes to medium sized gassers.

In our best-case scenarios with Starters contests advertised with plenty of anticipation, we got 15 new registered members for IMAC Colombia alone.

Inquiring further made us realize a lot of people have been wanting to compete for a long time, but they felt overwhelmed by the amount of scheduled dates, distances to travel, length of contests, size of planes usually found in the regular season and so on.

What was the lesson brought by the trial contest? People crave to give IMAC a try!

It's up to us to give more options to deal with the needs our pilots have. The only question I can think of is, why not?

Well we are preparing and building planes this winter to prepare for the upcoming 2023 season. A lot of time and money is spent each winter to have a happy successful season (no matter the outcome at a contest) where we enjoy our friendships and get to do quite a bit of flying in the end. Jeannette and I are preparing to have a great season and I'm happy to say both my boys are in the process of building IMAC rides. So, over the next couple of months go over those airplanes. Check your radios and clean those gimbals with some cotton swabs as I'm sure they are dirty from a year of dust. Go over those planes with a fine tooth comb. Check your batteries and cycle them at least twice before you start the new season. If you are reading a 10-20% drop from what you are use to then recycle those batteries for your fuel can and get yourself some new packs. Your servos, linkages, tailwheel, landing gear, exhaust should all be inspected.

A couple bucks now may prevent you from a lot of heartache later. One thing I always try to do at the beginning of the season is to go over my vehicle and trailer to make sure all grease fittings are greased and that I have all the tools I need and to have a spare for each part in my plane if I can. Getting organized with take apart tool boxes like the Packout, Flex, or Craftsman is always a great choice. You will be surprised at the end of the season the amount of tools and parts you start carrying with you. In the end, being prepared will make your flying weekend more enjoyable or make someone else's weekend more enjoyable due to your ability to assist them.

Well spring is around the corner and its time for judging school(s). This year; we are again, focusing on the new pilot. We will be having several online schools this year. On March 4th, we will be having an introduction to IMAC, on March 18th we will be hosting an online school focused on what to expect being a Basic pilot.
